In response to the new normal, the Schools Division Office of Dagupan through its Learning Resource Unit and Information Communication Technology Unit, established its Module Library.

The Module Library is a learning portal that serves as a gateway to all the learning resources from central office down to the locally developed modules which is an alternative mode of delivery.

It is a repository for teaching and learning materials and a platform where parents and learners can view and download the modules without going onsite.

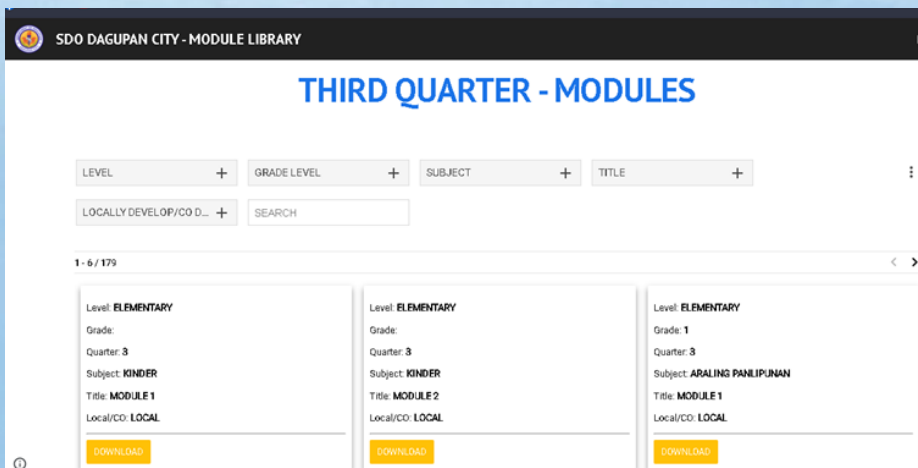
It features specific filters such as by grade level, subject, title of the module and category whether it is locally or centrally developed.

All modules uploaded were evaluated first from the LR Unit headed by Dr. Renata G. Rovillos, Education Program Supervisor.

It is one avenue in addressing the challenges in the Learning Continuity Plan (LCP) journey of DepEd Dagupan in the new normal. Since modules are readily available for download, this means that less physical contact and less paper consumption will be observed.

To date, the module library had 33,509 page views and downloads in the first quarter while 37,342 page views and downloads in the second quarter.

Moreover, third quarter modules are ready for download.

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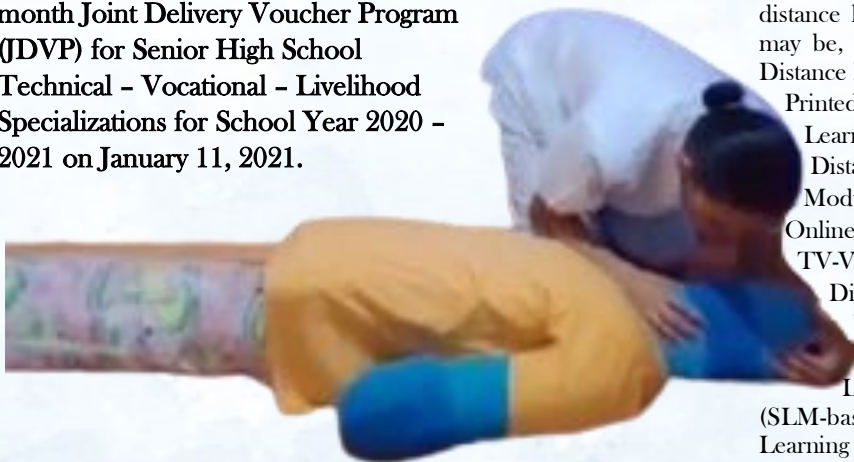
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ECIS carries out voucher program

East Central Integrated School (ECIS) started the three-month Joint Delivery Voucher Program (JDVP) for Senior High School Technical - Vocational - Livelihood Specializations for School Year 2020 - 2021 on January 11, 2021.

The implementation was in partnership with the Extencicare Training and Assessment Center which caters all the 24 Caregiving students who were in Grade 12. The program aimed to prepare the TVL students for their assessment once already allowed.

As one of the eight public schools offering senior high school in SDO Dagupan City, ECIS has been a recipient of the JDVP for its two TVL strands, Industrial Arts (IA) with specialization in Shielded Metal Arc Welding (SMAW) and Home Economics (HE) with specialization in Caregiving for the previous years.

However, for SY 2020 - 2021, only the Home Economics Strand with specialization in Caregiving was granted for the JDVP.

In adherence to DepEd Order No. 35, s. 2020 or the Guidelines on the Implementation of the JDVP for Senior High School Technical - Vocational - Livelihood Specializations for School Year 2020 - 2021 and TESDA Circular No. 062, s. 2020,

the implementation utilized the strategy distance learning. This is in response to the challenge of continuing education without the threat of being infected with COVID - 19 virus or its possible spread.

In adherence to the said issuances and to ensure the effective implementation of the program, ECIS opted to use the blended type of Distance Learning.

According to DM - CI - 2020 - 00162, Blended Distance Learning Modality is a combination

of any of the sub-categories of distance learning. The combination may be, but not limited to Online Distance Learning (ODL) and Printed Modular Distance Learning (PMDL), Online Distance Learning and Digital Modular Distance Learning, Online Distance Learning and TV-Video (SLM-based), Online Distance Learning and TV-Video (MELCs Mapped), Modular Distance Learning and TV-Video (SLM-based), Modular Distance Learning and TV-Video (MELCs Mapped) and others.

ECIS adopted the combination of ODL and PMDL in its implementation of the voucher program. All the 24 caregiving students through the JDVP underwent enhancement training for a minimum of 80 hours and maximum of 320 hours. Since one of the major concerns in using the online distance learning among students was the accessibility to internet, the JDVP - TVL partner, which is a private training and assessment center, provided the students with 600 peso-worth load

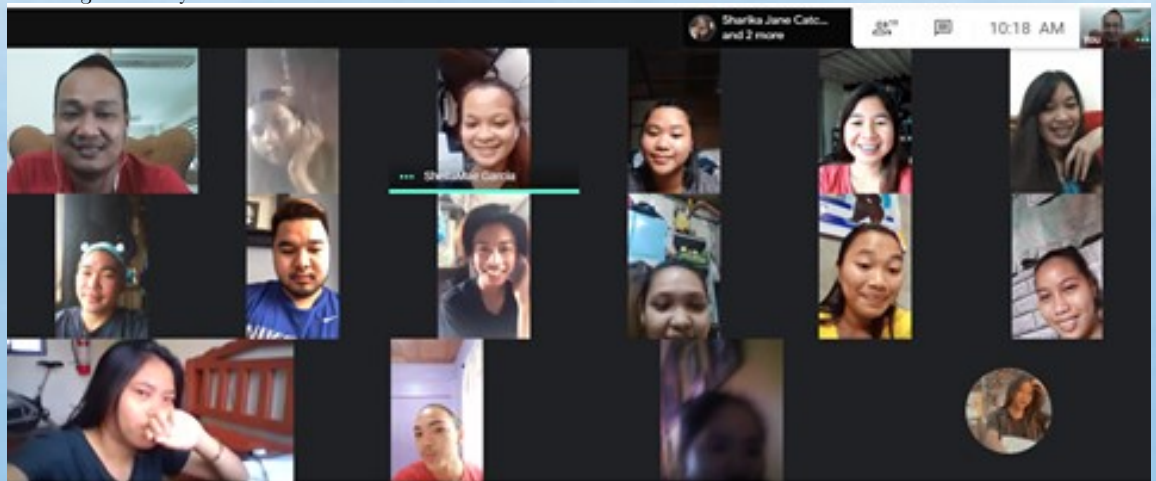
allowance for the entire duration of the program. The load allowance was used for their online class which was scheduled in Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays.

During the conduct of the online class, the students were given lectures and were furnished with materials they need in performing the tasks for the different skills. The materials also include the ingredients for food preparation for a patient.

Since their performances were done at home, students were required to take videos of their practicums and upload them in their Group Chat for evaluation. They were evaluated by the teacher - trainer.

In Modular Distance Learning, students were provided with printed modules for their readings and instructions for activities they have to accomplish. The modules were distributed to the parents by the staff of the JDVP - TVL partner.

The fulfillment of the JDVP was monitored by the Regional and Division JDVP Focal Persons, the school head, the School JDVP Focal Person and the class adviser.

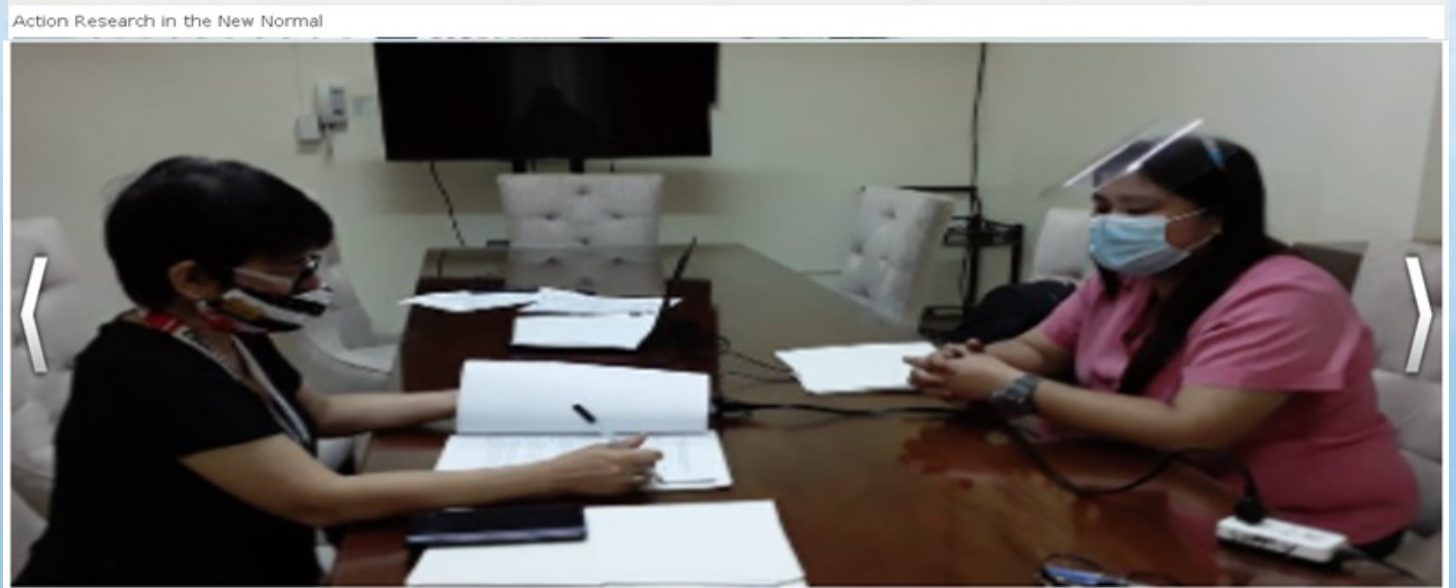
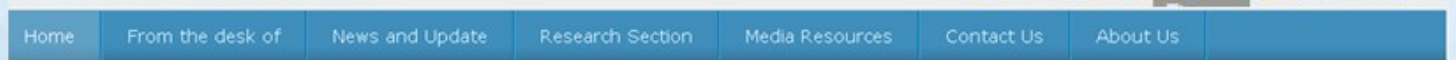
This contains soft copy of all documentary requirements as well as other necessary updates and guidelines for the information of teachers and non-teaching personnel.

As declared by Schools Division Superintendent Aguedo C. Fernandez during the Strategic Planning Conference held last December 9, 2020 attended and participated in by top management and other key officials, he expressed the need for all to submit a research study to address the challenges on learning outcomes brought about by the pandemic.
