Google Meet - Choosing an online platform wisely is the best way to save

our class. Google meet is accessible as long as the students have the link, and it can accommodate a hundred participants. I use its chatbox to get my students' answers so there will be an interaction even though I am not calling their names one by one. The chatbox is also a great help if my students have problems with their microphones and audio.



Dualless - This is an extension of Google Chrome. I use this to split my screen in a discussion to see both

of my students' responses in the chatbox and my lesson itself. .



Meet Attendance - This is another Chrome Extension

that I use to automatically check my Google Meet class attendance.



JamBoard - This is a feature of Google Meet that serves as my whiteboard while I am

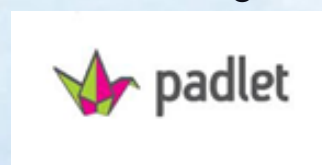
discussing my lessons.



Wheel of Names -

This online tool is a random name picker that I use to call my students' attention. If I want to let a

particular student read or recite, I call them using this random picker. This is also a great help in preventing a student from being called over and over again.



Padlet - This is a free online tool where my students share their ideas in connection with our lesson.



Quizizz - This is an online assessment tool that I use in some of my lessons. I use this to reinforce what my

students previously learned from our class.

There are a lot more online tools that we can use in our online class. We just have to explore what suits our abilities and what is best for our students.
